The IG must ensure that the complainant understands the Privacy Act statement before the IG begins working the complainant's case (prescriptive provision in Army Regulation 20-1, paragraph 6-1d (1) (b)).b. Consent: The IG will read the consent options to the complainant located at the bottom of the DA Form 1559. The IG must ensure that the complainant understands the consent options. The IG will then annotate whether or not the complainant consents to the release of his or her personal information and / or documents provided to the IG before the IG begins working the complainant's case (prescriptive provision in Army Regulation 20-1, paragraph 6-1d (1) (b)).c. Read Back the DA Form 1559: The IG will read back to the complainant the information taken during the telephonic interview for clarity and accuracy. d. Telephonic: When taking complaints via the telephone, the IG will annotate in the signature block the word "Telephonic" on the DA Form 1559. The Inspector General may forward to the complainant a copy of the DA Form 1559 for that person's records, a. Written Follow-up Documentation: The IG will ask the complainant to forward any supporting documentation to the Inspector General office."

If so, what are the specific facts and circumstances? (2) Has SFC Michael Forbes engaged in counterproductive or toxic leadership behaviors within the Brigade or battalion S2 sections as discussed in AR 600-100, Chapter 1-11d and ADP 6-22? If so, what are the specific facts and circumstances."

They must remain vigilant to guard against counterproductive leadership behaviors from themselves as well as in the units with which they serve. Counterproductive

leadership can take different forms, from incompetence to abusiveness, all of which have detrimental impacts on individuals, the unit, and the accomplishment of the mission. Counterproductive leadership behaviors can span a range of behaviors to include bullying, distorting information, refusing to listen to subordinates, abusing authority, retaliating, blaming others, poor self-control (loses temper), withholding encouragement, dishonesty, unfairness, unjustness, showing little or no respect, talking down to others, behaving erratically, and taking credit for others' work. One such type of counterproductive leadership is toxic leadership, which is defined as a combination of self-centered attitudes, motivations, and behaviors that have adverse effects on subordinates, the organization, and mission performance. To be classified as toxic, the counterproductive behaviors must be recurrent and have a deleterious impact on the organization's performance or the welfare of subordinates. An exacerbating factor may be if the behaviors demonstrate selfish reasons such as elevating one's own status, grabbing power, or otherwise obtaining personal gain. Counter-productive leadership behaviors prevent the establishment of a positive organizational climate, preclude other leaders from fulfilling their requirements, and may prevent the unit from achieving its mission. They will lead to investigations and, potentially, removal from position or other punitive actions. Army leaders are required to utilize self-awareness programs (MSAF, CDR360, and others) to ensure they receive feedback indicating whether they exhibit appropriate behaviors for an Army leader. Army leaders are required to provide performance and professional growth counseling to subordinate leaders to prevent or remedy counterproductive leadership."

Q(13)(d): Admit that Maj. Racaza wrote in her declarative statement on DA Form 2823, on January 19, 2023, the following phrases in a sentence, "At that time, SFC Forbes also... I provide him with regulations or policy on what right the BDE CDR has to... his participation in the[?]"

Q(13)(e): Admit that Maj. Racaza wrote in her declarative statement on DA Form 2823, on January 19, 2023, the following sentence, "He... making him do a behavioral health evaluation."

Q(13)(f): Admit that Maj. Racaza wrote in her declarative statement on DA Form 2823, on January 19, 2023 the following sentence, "On 30NOV22 (sic) approximately 1345, SFC Forbes was speaking...[disputed verbiage] ...to my NCO, SGT Aldeguir."

Q(14)(a): Admit that Cpt. Korista, David, the Plaintiff's Company Commander, conducted a meeting and delivered the Developmental Counseling Form (DA Form 4856) on February 7, 2023, that contained the following statement, "EVENT ORIENTED COUNSELING — COMMANDER'S INVESTIGATION FLAG (L) you are being flagged for being the subject of a Commander's Investigation. A Flag is the temporary suspension of favorable personnel actions such as promotions or special duty assignments. The Flag will remain in effect until the proceeding is complete and the issue resolved or adverse action is complete. The DA Form 268 which initiates the Flag is attached. Its sole purpose is to notify you of a personnel Flag action and is possible consequences."

68) A(14)(b): Affirm or Deny

Q(14)(b): Admit that the Plaintiff lost his promotable status to Master Sergeant due to either: 1) the Relief-for-Cause, Non-Commissioned Officer Evaluation report with Senior Rater Cpt. Lowrie, with thru date of July 12, 2023; or 2) the General Officer Memorandum of Reprimand signed by Brig. Gen. Ferguson, dated May 30, 2023.

Q(15)(a): Admit that the Plaintiff's Government Legal Assistance Attorney, Henry R. Carras, receive an email in his account (henry.r.carras.mil@army.mil) from the account of 2nd Lt. Please let me know if you have any questions and have a great night."

Q(15)(b): Admit that the Plaintiff, in his DA Form 2823, "Sworn Statement," dated February 23, 2023 provided the following statement in answer to Q[uestion]2b, "Not applicable. I don't understand what witnesses you want to view a leadership style that spans two excellent NCOERs while I was BDE NCOIC and Acting OIC. Clarification is needed."

Q(16): Admit that on April 20, 2023, Col. Tavi Brunson digitally signed a document entitled, "REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS BY INVESTIGATING OFFICER," that included the comment "Approved with the following modifications:" and "I approve the finding as it relates to counter productive(sic) leadership, but disapprove the finding of harassment."

72) A(17)(a): Affirm or Deny

Q(17)(a): Admit that on May 22, 2023, Col. Tavi Brunson digitally signed a document entitled, "REPORT OF PROCEEDINGS BY INVESTIGATING OFFICER," that had the comment "2. I disapprove the finding of harassment, pursuant to AR 600-20. 33. I approve the finding of disrespect to a senior commissioned officer, pursuant to Article 89, Uniform Code of Military Justice."

ANSWER:

73) A(17)(b): Affirm or Deny

Q(17)(b): Admit that on May 22, 2023, was there a 62 minute gap between Col. Brunson's receipt of an email from the Plaintiff at 2:42 p.m. that informed Col. Brunson that the Plaintiff "went to WAMC to get her [Maj. Racaza's] credentialing," and informed Col. Brunson of the Plaintiff's intent to file a "licensee complaint," and Col. Brunson's digital signature at 3:44 p.m. that upgraded the investigation of the Plaintiff to include "disrespect to a senior commissioned officer."

74) A(18a): Affirm or Deny

Q(18a): Admit that on May 30, 2023, that Brigadier General Lawrence G. Ferguson, signed a "MEMORANDUM FOR SFC Michael Forbes, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 528th Special Troops Battalion (Special Operations) (Airborne), 528th Sustainment Brigade (Special Operations) (Airborne) Fort Bragg, North Carolina, 28310" with "SUBJECT: General Officer Memorandum of Reprimand" that stated, "You are hereby reprimanded for being disrespectful in language and deportment towards a Field Grade officer and for engaging in counterproductive leadership On 30 November 2022, you were disrespectful in language and deportment during a conversation with a senior commission officer, by raising your voice at her and talking over her. Also, during you time as Brigade S2, NCOIC, you engaged in counterproductive leadership by being quick to anger, erratic, disrespectful, and by failing to take accountability for your mistakes."

75) A(18)(b): Affirm or Deny

Q(18)(b): Admit that a Senior Non-Commissioned Officer is permitted and expected to professionally and matter-of-factly inform another Soldier that the Soldier's actions are not in compliance with Executive Orders, or regulations, and is not considered Counterproductive by the Army' definition as found in AR 600-100, 1-11d, that the Investigating Officer, 2nd Lt. Tolston, used for the investigation?

ANSWER:

76) A(18)(c): Affirm or Deny

Bearing true faith and allegiance is a matter of believing in and devoting yourself to something or someone. A loyal Soldier is one who supports the leadership and stands up for fellow Soldiers. By wearing the uniform of the U.S. Army you are expressing your loyalty. And by doing your share, you show your loyalty to your unit. DUTY [-] Fulfill your obligations. Doing your duty means more than carrying out your assigned tasks. Duty means being able to accomplish tasks as part of a team. The work of the U.S. Army is a complex combination of missions, tasks and responsibilities — all in constant motion. Our work entails building one assignment onto another. You fulfill your obligations as a part of your unit every time you resist the temptation to take "shortcuts" that might undermine the integrity of the final product. RESPECT [-] Treat people as they should be treated. In the Soldier's Code, we pledge to "treat others with dignity and respect while expecting others to do the same." Respect is what allows us to appreciate the best in other people. Respect is trusting that all people have done their jobs and fulfilled their duty. And selfrespect is a vital ingredient with the Army value of respect, which results from knowing you have put forth your best effort. The Army is one team and each of us has something to contribute. SELFLESS SERVICE [-] Put the welfare of the nation, the Army and your subordinates before your own. Selfless service is larger than just one person. In serving your country, you are doing your duty loyally without thought of recognition or gain. The basic building block of selfless service is the commitment of each team member to go a little further, endure a little longer, and look a little closer to see how he or she can add to the effort. HONOR [-] Live up to Army values. The nation's highest military award is The Medal of Honor. This award goes to Soldiers who make honor a matter of daily living — Soldiers who develop the habit of being honorable, and solidify that habit with every value choice they make. Honor is a matter of carrying out, acting, and living the values of respect, duty, loyalty, selfless service, integrity and personal courage in everything you do. INTEGRITY [-] Do what's right, legally and morally. Integrity is a quality you develop by adhering to moral principles. It requires that you do and say nothing that deceives others. As your integrity grows, so does the trust others place in you. The more choices you make based on integrity, the more this highly prized value will affect your relationships with family and friends, and, finally, the fundamental acceptance of yourself. PERSONAL COURAGE [-] Face fear, danger or adversity (physical or moral). Personal courage has long been associated with our Army. With physical courage, it is a matter of enduring physical

duress and at times risking personal safety. Facing moral fear or adversity may be a long, slow process of continuing forward on the right path, especially if taking those actions is not popular with others. You can build your personal courage by daily standing up for and acting upon the things that you know are honorable[?]"

Q(18)(h): Admit that the following paragraphs are part of the U.S. Army NCO Creed, "No one is more professional than I. I am a noncommissioned officer, a leader of Soldiers. I am proud of the Corps of noncommissioned officers and will at all times conduct myself so as to bring credit upon the Corps, the military service and my country regardless of the situation in which I find myself. I will not use my grade or position to attain pleasure, profit, or personal safety. Competence is my watchword. My two basic responsibilities will always be uppermost in my mind-accomplishment of my mission and the welfare of my Soldiers. I will strive to remain technically and tactically proficient. I am aware of my role as a noncommissioned officer. I will fulfill my responsibilities inherent in that role. All Soldiers are entitled to outstanding leadership; I will provide that leadership. I know my Soldiers and I will always place their needs above my own. I will communicate consistently with my Soldiers and never leave them uninformed. I will be fair and impartial when recommending both rewards and punishment. Officers of my unit will have maximum time to accomplish their duties; they will not have to accomplish mine. I will earn their respect and confidence as well as that of my Soldiers. I will be loyal to those with whom I serve; seniors, peers, and subordinates alike. I will exercise initiative by taking appropriate action in the absence of orders. I will not compromise my integrity, nor my moral courage. I will not forget, nor will I allow my comrades to forget that we are professionals, noncommissioned officers, leaders."

Q(18)(i): Admit that on the Military Protection order, issued by Cpt. David Korista, with SFC Michael J. Forbes as the SUBJECT SERVICE MEMBER, dated June 1, 2023, states that "Maj. Rhea Racaza" is named as a "PROTECTED PERSON" and that the form states the reason as "Fear of reprisal by Subject?"

83) A(19)(a): Affirm or Deny

Q(19)(a): Admit that CSM Emekaekwue abstained from any recommendation for the permanent filing of the GOMOR in the Plaintiff's permanent record on the "1st SFC (A), Staff Judge Advocate, GOMOR TRANSMITTAL FORM."

Q(19)(b): Admit that Col. Brunson stated in the "Comments" section of the "ISFC (A) Staff Judge Advocate, GOMOR TRANSMITTAL FORM," "Sir, recommend filing this GOMOR in the NCO's AMHRR. SFC Forbes has a demonstrated history of being cancerous to organizations ad his current tenure in the 528SB is indicative of that history. SFC Forbes' substantiated AR 15-6 investigation denotes him as a toxic leader, disruptive to good order and discipline, and erratic. During the course of the AR 15-6, despite being given the opportunity to serve in his career field in another battalion, he continued to exhibit similar if not the same behavior. SFC Forbes' presence in this command is wholly indicative of counterproductive leadership and the caliber of toxicity that is deleterious to command climates. Given his continued poor performance as a Non-Commissioned Officer, I recommend a permanent filing."

Q(19)(b): Admit that 1SG Deleon had not taken responsibility of Headquarters and Headquarters Company yet, on December 19, 2022 when the Plaintiff was removed from his Brigade S2 NCOIC position.

Q(20)(a): Admit that instructing any Soldier, who had no Exception to Policy paperwork on their person, pursuant to standing Policies and Regulations, to immediately remove their phone from a classified building, thereby immediately directing compliance with Army Regulations, does not fall in the definition of AR 600-100, 1-11d, dated April 5, 2017, a regulation used in Col. Brunson's investigating officer appointment order instructions to 2LT Tolston.

McSweeney, Chief, Retirements and Separations Branch, and dated October 23, 2023, the code that reads "DA 2166-9-2-R 2023-07-12" specifically represents the 'Relief for Cause Non-Commissioned Officer Evaluation Report 'of SFC Michael J. Forbes with "THRU" date of "20230712" and the Rater was "CPT Patrina A.Lowrie, and signed July 21, 2023?

Forbes and the signature was provided by "Brigadier General Lawrence G. Ferguson?"

Q(22)(a): Admit that in paragraphs "2." and 2.a. of the "MEMORANDUM THRU Commander, US Army Special Operations Command, 2929 Desert Storm Drive, Fort Bragg, NC 28310-5200 FOR SFC FORBES, MICHAEL J,(sic) 1295918507" with "SUBJECT: Notification of Denial of Continued Active Duty Service under the Qualitative Management Program (QMP)", signed by Michael R. McSweeney, Chief, Retirements and Separations Branch, and dated May 29, 2024, that these two paragraphs mean that the Plaintiff will be separated from the Army two months and 12 days prior to the opportunity for the Plaintiff to engage the protections of 10 USC § 1176 and

seamlessly fulfill his service contract, to which the Plaintiff is a party, enabling him to receive a retirement after 17 years of unblemished service?
